<u>Showers</u>

During October and November, our neighbors were given the opportunity to enjoy a shower and a change of clean clothes. All Saints' Church has previously worked with the **WAVE Project Mission** and recently invited them back on Tuesdays when

provided 2,300 showers and hundreds of items of clothing and hygiene essentials last year. With site partners in Macomb, Oakland, and Wayne counties, WAVE Project is poised to serve the homeless community in a unique way and to impact generations to come.

They bring a 23 foot long, 3 - stall mobile shower trailer to wherever there is need. Each private stall is equipped with a toilet, sink, and stand-up shower and all the supplies needed to shower up. They have been providing this service since August 2019. In 2021 they added their Essentials Van, a mobile clothing closet. It contains free underwear, socks, tee shirts, pants and hygiene essentials.

A shower to a person in the homeless community is both a physical and emotional experience. You know how you feel after a nice hot shower. Imagine how a



homeless person who may not have had a shower for weeks or months feels. The mobile trailer can serve three showers at a

time. Each person is allowed about 15 minutes, or longer if others aren't waiting for showers. The shower trailer is on the road six days a week. Volunteers **Kevin** and **Brenden** service the showers and **Laura** hands out fresh clothing from the Essentials Van.

Matchan cannot thank Wave Project enough for bringing this unique and needed service to our neighbors. The homeless not only appreciate the showers provided, but the love and respect that is shown them. Thank you, Wave Project. 2023 Year End Report

Our mission at the Matchan Nutrition Center is to serve hot, well balanced meals to our neighbors in need, to provide them with well-rounded groceries to take home to feed their families, and to provide other life changing assistance that leads to selfsufficiency locally in Oakland County. Our ability to carry out this mission greatly depends on the support of our donors and volunteers. Matchan has been successful because people believe in what we do and the way it is done. This is why we feel it is important to report to you each year, through this Newsletter and on our website (www.matchannutritioncenter.org).

The Matchan Nutrition Center is a soup kitchen and pantry sponsored by the Society of St. Vincent de Paul. We are now located in All Saints' Episcopal Church in Pontiac right outside the Pontiac Loop. It has been 13 months since we relocated.

The Matchan pantry, sometimes called the Market Place, is located on the lower floor of the church in a gym. It has grown considerably since our move and is certainly making a difference in the lives of the people we serve. The room for give-away clothing has also expanded. People shop with carts for dairy products, bakery products, meats (when we have them), fresh fruits and vegetables, canned goods, and clothing. This includes the fresh baked sweets that the **Ladies of Charity** bring every Tuesday morning. A hot, nourishing meal is served on the third floor in the auditorium of the church. A visitor once said to me, "It's sort of like **Hudson's** use to be. After you are done shopping, you go up a level and have lunch."

Our Vision is to ensure that no one in the Pontiac area goes hungry and to create recovery and stability for those in poverty.

We do so by serving a hot nutritious meal for them on Tuesdays and Thursdays and by providing them with healthy foods from the five food groups (fruits and vegetables, starchy foods, proteins, dairy products and fats and sugars) to take home for their families' daily meals.

We also try to help them solve their problems, both spiritually and physically, so they can live a more comfortable life. We bring them in contact with other free resources that can help them successfully achieve this.

Saint Paul Street Evangelization (SPSE) helps them spiritually by sharing the Gospel with them. Under the direction of Anne Harman, volunteers have been setting up their evangelization table with rosaries and brochures related to the faith for seven years. They talk and pray with those who visit their table.

The **Christian Legal Aid Program** has been helping our neighbors physically since 2007. Robert Bunger coordinates a group of six lawyers, including him, so people can meet with a licensed attorney to obtain cost free legal counsel.

At another table **Jerry Samona**, a sales representative from **Humana**, provides cost appropriate health insurance for our neighbors (if they wish).

Hygiene kits are made available for both men and women. Clothing is always set out for our neighbors to take, and sometimes showers are made available (see additional articles in this newsletter). In time, we hope to again bring in the government, health and social agencies that came to Matchan before we relocated.

The Kitchen: 8,676 meals were served this year. This is an average of only 87 meals per day. We started with fewer meals when first relocating, but are now serving about 130 to 140 each day and rising. Most of the food for the meals is purchased. The donations of meat and vegetables that come in are too small, and there is not enough storage space to save small quantities until there is enough for a meal. However, much of the food that is purchased comes from **Gleaners** at 18¢ per pound. Total food cost for the year was \$5,240, which is only about \$50 per day.


The Pantry: There is a notable increase in the need for food. This year, 268,580 pounds were recorded as donated. Unfortunately, many times food is dropped off and left unrecorded because volunteers are busy, so the value is probably higher. We purchase 60 dozen eggs for each market day and other fruits and vegetables if needed to provide wellrounded groceries when donations are low. \$17,267 was spent on food for the pantry this year.

Volunteers are the backbone of our operation. Matchan operates with about 39 volunteers, with 23 or more working each day. The total number of volunteer hours was 17,738 this year. Our "Working Board" put in 7,538 of these hours.

In-kind goods totaling about \$460,000 were donated from Gleaners, Panera, Whole Foods, Ellen's Café, Gordon Food Service, Trader Joes, Metro Food Rescue, Food Rescue US, Hospitality House, St. Thomas More Conference, Holy Name Parish, and various food drives. Excess donations were distributed to other organizations.

In-kind services totaled \$75,000. This is primarily our volunteer legal counseling.

Where does the money come from to support the Matchan operation? We had about 343 donors last year. This Chart summarizes where the funds come



conduct a Thanksgiving Turkey Drive and an Easter Ham Drive for us each year. Government funds came from **EFSP** (Emergency Food and Shelter Program). All donated money is used to support our mission.

Where does the money go? Operational costs were \$69,573 this year. The chart below shows where the money goes. Most of the money is spent on food. \$17.267 is for pantry food and \$5,240 for hot meals.

Other Activities: Often we have a clothing table where clients can get gloves, hats, coats and various other clothing. Vincent de Paul Detroit provides us

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stores and donate them to Matchan.

Hygiene kits are still assembled and made available to our guests. Sleeping bags that are made by Helping Hands in Troy are given to those in needs. The Oakland County Sheriff's Department donates approximately 150 coats each year. Matchan

purchases emergency clothing such as boots or work shoes that are not available at the SVdP stores.

We are proud of the work that we have done during these challenging times and the endurance of our volunteers. We sincerely thank you for your
